With a 90+ member club, communication is key! It is critical to find efficient and effective means to reach out to all our members and ensure that they are informed and feel included in all the activities of the club - and feel valued as members through such communication. The ability to communicate with the public and the community is also important.

<u>Club Newsletter</u>: Altrusa Tidings is published regularly in electronic format and contains a wealth of information about club activities - past, present, and future. Email notifications were sent to members and others when each issue was published and available on the club website (www.altrusarichardson.com). The newsletter is a great marketing tool as members can simply direct guests, community supporters, and potential members to review our newsletters to see what we are all about.

<u>Club Website</u>: We continue to use a non-profit on-line membership management software (Wild Apricot) to help facilitate communication with members and the general public – it is a great tool with useful features that help enhance the productivity and efficiency of our club! The club website (www.altrusarichardson.com) contains valuable information for both the general public and potential members; it is a valuable interactive tool for club members as well. Each service committee has their own webpage showcasing their activities and projects.

- Club Members can log into the website for access to "member-only" information, for example: view the on-line membership directory; pay dues and invoices (via PayPal); review club minutes, agendas, budgets, treasurer reports, and committee lists and so much more; and view / register for upcoming club events and activities. Club forms are easily accessible along with a wealth of District and International information and links. To view the "Member Only Information", we encourage you to sign in as an "Altrusa Guest". (see attached Website material tab for Username and Password)
- Our major fundraiser, "Outstanding Women of Today" (OWT) Annual Awards Luncheon, has its own webpage, which is useful in (1) providing forms necessary to make a nomination; (2) making a luncheon reservation and paying via PayPal; and/or (3) being a sponsor of the event. We have enhanced this website by including nominees/honorees photos of previous year events to generate excitement. All forms and detailed information about the event are on the website so members can direct the public, potential nominators, nominees, and sponsors about the event.

Emails: Through the website, the majority of club communications can be automated. Emails are automatically sent through the website software so event announcement emails can be delivered several days prior to an event, a reminder can be sent a few day before the event, and members who registered on-line for an event are sent a final reminder email the day before the event. Email management is no longer an administrative nightmare. Protocol is set up in the software in advance and emails are automated from that point forward. What a time saver! Emails are used to inform members of upcoming and recent events as well as volunteer opportunities and membership updates. It is a great way to reach out to our members and help them feel connected (see attached examples).

<u>Publicity</u>: Most years, our publicity is focused on "Outstanding Women of Today", our annual fundraiser; however, this year we also achieved recognition for our Kindness Action Ninja (KAN) weekend and, most importantly, Altrusa Richardson was featured in the 2019 State of the City Address. The Address gave recognition to Community Partnerships and our very own Mary Osentowski was interviewed as part of the video presentation now available on the city website and YouTube. In *RichardsonToday*, we received "In the Spotlight" recognition in connection with the Address as well. Altrusa Richardson also received publicity for accepting grant applications and the World Peace Art Contest, just to name a few. All this helps achieve name recognition for Altrusa in so many ways!

Other: Altrusa Richardson has been recognized and publicized in a variety of creative ways. We sponsor the cat adoption room at the Richardson Animal Shelter with a wall mural displaying an "Altrusa" ball of yarn and paddock sponsorship at the Dog Park. We continue to use our "big check" when making donations to non-profit organizations and readily have business cards and brochures available. We invested in large banner and pop-up displays to also increase community presence and they make great photo opts! Our Choose Kind Library displays in numerous schools locally and internationally reflect our outreach – near and far. Through various community support outlets, we continue to receive recognition and publicity to help Altrusa be more widely recognizable (see attached examples).



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

"Turning Tragedy Into Triumph: How a Secret Service Agent Survived 9/11"

Speaker: Samantha "Sam" Horowitz

Join us on June 21st at 7:00 pm for "Turning Tradegdy Into Triumph: How a Secret Service Agent Survived 9/11" with speaker Samantha "Sam" Horowitz. Register on the website by noon Monday, June 18, to ensure your reservation.

About the speaker: After graduating from the University of Maryland, College Park and Howard University School of Law, Sam was accepted by the United States Secret Service. She was the only female in her graduating class to complete extensive training at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center and the James J. Rowley Training Center. She was assigned to the New York Field Office, doing investigative case work in Electronic Crimes Task Force and provided protection to several Presidents, Former Presidents, First Ladies, and foreign dignitaries. September 11, 2001, was a turning point in her life... She was in the World Trade Center's North Tower when American Airlines Flight 11 struck it. After many difficult months, she made the heart wrenching decision to leave the Secret Service due to the effects of PTS (post-traumatic stress). After struggling for over a year, she found the help she needed and got well. She pursued a career in the Health & Wellness industry as owner of a sports performance center in Maryland. After realizing that Law Enforcement was still "in her blood," she returned to the law enforcement community in Montgomery County, Maryland as a Lieutenant in Executive Protection. She retired from law enforcement in 2012. She currently resides in Rockwall.


valued by Altrusa and the community at large. We have had a lot of compliments and recognition and I am proud to be part of this wonderful club.

On April 6, 2019, our members will gather at Friends Place at 9:00 am to fill, seal, address, and mail the boxes. Notes of encouragement will be included (with deepest thanks for their service) from the Kindness Ninjas of Altrusa Richardson.

SUGGESTED ITEMS: SNACKS — Salty and Sweet

COOKIES — plain/iced oatmeal, raisin, peanut butter, sugar and molasses, homemade or store bought

CRACKERS — no saltines, but Trisket, Chickn-in-a-basket, Ritz. Wheat Thins, etc.: Chips in cans; cheese crackers

FRUIT SNACK — (Resealable bags) dried banana chips, apple slices, apricots; golden raisins; freeze dried berries; Trader Joe's fruit tapes

NUTS — cans or small individual sleeves of mixed nuts, honey roasted peanuts, almonds, pistachios, macadamias, sunflower or pumpkin seeds

DIPS/CONDIMENTS - small cans of bean or cheese dip

MEATS/FISH —Slim Jims or other individual packaged beef (no pork); non-perishable beef jerky or beef sausage; (make sure labled USDA Beef); Quality canned sardines, smoked oysters or clams

BEVERAGES/SOUP — (to mix with water or milk) instant breakfast; Gatorade/sweetened drink mixes, water enhancers (liquid or crystal); instant coffee or cocoa, lemonade, tea bags, creamer; soup in a cup

CEREAL — (small 6 /8 packs) Frosted Flakes, Trix, Cheerios, Nuts & Honey, Honeycomb

ENERGY/PROTEIN BARS — granola bars, small bags of trail mix (no chocolate), snack cakes

ENHANCERS — to mix with MRE's (Meals Ready to Eat), ramen noodles, seasoned salt, packets of hot sauce, mustard, relish, ketchup; taco seasoning for meat or chicken

TOILETRIES — toothbrush, toothpaste, dental floss piks; cotton swabs, shaving lotion, disposable razors, shampoo, small packages tissues; individually packaged baby wipes, eye drops, lip balm, lotion; aspirin and other pain relievers; feminine hygiene products; zinc oxide crème in tubes; moleskin, foot powder

ENTERTAINMENT — paperback books, current magazines, comic books, word games, crossword puzzles, foam footballs and basketballs, frisbees, hacky sacks, playing cards, yo-yos, Sunday comics, coloring books and colored pencils

OTHER HELPFUL ITEMS — large rolls of "gaffers" tape in black green and tan (like duct tape but fabric) matte finish only — not shiny; Batteries (no lithium) size AA & D are in high demand

WRITING MATERIALS — notepaper, stationary, envelopes, pens pencils and stamps







World AIDS Day, December 1, 2018: Significant progress has been made in the AIDS response since 1988, and today three in four people living with HIV know their status. Human Rights Day, December 10, 2018: The Universal Declaration of Human Rights Turns 70

Human Rights Day is observed every year on 10 December – the day the United Nations General Assembly adopted, in 1948, the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u>. This year, Human Rights Day marks the <u>70th anniversary</u> of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, a milestone document that proclaimed the inalienable rights which everyone is inherently entitled to as a human being – regardless of race, color, religion, sex, language, politi-

cal or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. It is the most translated document in the world, available in more than 500 languages.

The best leaders use various approaches to communicate since members understand and respond differently to written and spoken messages. The only message that matters is the one received so a successful leader makes certain that the listener understands.

They encourage members to do their best and provide necessary guidance so that those individuals are successful. This builds confidence and a willingness to assume other responsibilities within the organization. This requires flexibility and the ability to see issues and situations from a variety of viewpoints. Good leaders are good listeners. "Leadership has a harder job to do than just choose sides. Unlike Superman, leaders cannot leap tall buildings, cannot do magic and they are not perfect. Altrusa leaders are dedicated individuals who want the best for the organization and for their communities. Altrusans are "Leaders in Service." "An empowered organization is one in which individuals have knowledge skill, desire, and opportunity to personally succeed in a way that leads to collective organizational success." 
Proposed Changes to Board Job Descriptions To Be Discussed May 2nd

KAN Helps South Sudanese Refugees

Through Days for Girls Project

On April 6, 2019, over thirty volunteers, which included Pamela Moore and Cathie Ford from the Highland Village Days for Girls Team, as well as Altrusa members of Richardson, Collin County and the Garland Altrusa Clubs helped assemble 207 "refugee" feminine kits to send over to a South Sudanese refugee camp. In addition to assembling these kits, volunteers also were putting snaps on additional shields and threading and completing the sewing on many bags. It was very interesting to see how much work and attention goes into making every kit as perfect as it can be. Club members also donated over 150 wash clothes, over 350 Freezer Ziplock bags, over 75 soaps, and over 60 pairs of panties. The rest of the supplies needed for this project were purchased with a \$140 donation. According to the Highland Village Days for Girls Director, Pamela Moore, we accomplished quite a feat and she was extremely grateful for our help.

This Summer, on June 3, 2019, twelve members of the Highland Village Days for Girls Team will take the 207 Refugee Feminine Kits along with several other kits and supplies a 15-hour flight from DFW to Doha, Uganda. Then, after a brief rest, they will depart for Entebbe and from there drive to Kampala, Uganda's capital. While in this area of Uganda, they will visit Pearls Children's Home, Kiryeka School for Disabilities, and Batwa School for Girls. Then, on June 17, the group will travel to a South Sudanese Refugee camp in the northern region of Uganda. Currently, there are over one million South Sudanese refugees in refugee camps in Uganda needing assistance. Days for Girls volunteers have been preparing feminine hygiene kits all year to distribute to women and girls as they visit these difference locations. Altrusa Richardson was excited to be an integral part of helping create these refugee kits for this important Summer Trip. The refugee kits put together during our event on April 6th were "half-kits" or "refugee kits" and, as such, have fewer liners and, because of the need for greater quantities in these camps, the women and girls are resourceful and are able to manage with fewer liners.

April 2019 U.N. Days and Other Observances

TIME OF REMEMBRANCE AND RECONCILIATION FOR THOSE WHO LOST THEIR LIVES DURING THE SEC-OND WORLD WAR; May 8-9, 2019: By resolution 59/26 of November 22, 2004, the UN General Assembly declared May 8-9 as a time of remembrance and reconciliation and, while recognizing that Member States may have individual days of victory, liberation and commemoration, invited all Member States, organizations of the United Nations System, non-governmental organizations and individuals to observe annually either one or both of these days in an appropriate manner to pay tribute to all victims of the Second World War.

The Assembly stressed that this historic event established the conditions for the creation of the United Nations, designed to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, and called upon the Member States of the United Nations to unite their efforts in dealing with new challenges and threats, with the United Nations playing a central role, and to make every effort to settle all disputes by peaceful means in conformity with the Charter of the United Nations and in such a manner that international peace and security are not endangered.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF FAMILIES; May 15, 2019: Although families all over the world have transformed greatly over the past decades in terms of their structure and as a result of global trends and demographic changes, the United Nations still recognizes the family as the basic unit of society. The International Day of Families provides an opportunity to promote awareness of issues relating to families and to increase knowledge of the social, economic and demographic processes affecting them. It has inspired a series of awareness-raising events, including national family days. In many countries, this day is an opportunity to highlight different areas of interest and importance to families.

The International Day of Families is observed on the 15th of May every year. Activities include workshops and conferences, radio and television programs, newspaper articles and cultural programs highlighting relevant themes.

2019 Theme: "Families and Climate Action: Focus on SDG13"

The 2019 observance focuses on families, family policies and major <u>SDG13</u> targets:

SDG 13 target 13.3: Improve education, awareness-raising and human and institutional capacity on climate change mitigation, adaptation, impact reduction and early warning

SDG 13 target 13.2: Integrate climate change measures into national policies, strategies and planning

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF UN PEACEKEEPERS, May 29, 2019: The day offers a chance to pay tribute to the contributions of uniformed and civilian personnel to the work of the Organization and to honor more than 3,700 peacekeepers who have lost their lives serving under the UN flag since 1948.

Over seven decades, more than one million men and women have served under the United Nations flag in 71 peacekeeping operations, directly impacting the lives of hundreds of millions of people, protecting the world's most vulnerable and saving countless lives. Our peacekeepers make immense sacrifices, often serving at great personal risk and under challenging conditions. The families of peacekeepers and their governments share this sacrifice.

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Seniors Committee

Our Seniors Committee provides many diverse services to seniors in the Richardson area. These projects include:



Appletree Court Auction: Twice a year, once in the fall and again in the spring, Altrusans help organize an auction of collected items. Residents use "Appletree Bucks", which they have earned through participation in activities in the home, to purchase the items. Collected items include greeting cards and stamps, decks of cards, cologne and perfume, purses, Kleenex, toiletries, vases of flowers, books, and other items of interest to seniors.

Atria Assisted Living Center in Richardson Auction: Twice a year Altrusa facilitates an Auction at Atria similar to the one described at Appletree Court. We hold these auctions in the Fall and in the Spring. Atria supplies the auction items and Altrusans provide the Auctioneer and volunteers!





Atria Bingo: Monthly, Altrusans set up and call Bingo at the Atria Assisted Living Center.

The Richardson Public Library Book Rotation: The Richardson Public Library received a state grant to provide large-print books and books-on-tape to the growing Richardson Senior population. On a quarterly basis, Altrusans help the Richardson Library by providing the volunteers to move large print books and tapes between 10 local assisted living centers. This project provides a constantly rotating supply of books to the residents of the local centers and brings library services to them.





Tie One On for Father's Day Event: This event is held at Friend's Place Adult Day Services Center in Richardson on the Friday before Father's Day each year. Altrusans lend a helping hand for the event. Seniors are treated to an array of antique cars to view plus other special events to entertain them, and then to a kunch of grilled hamburgers and hot dogs!

Mother's Day Tea: This event is held the Friday before Mother's Day also at Friend's Place Adult Day Services in Richardson. This is a lovely luncheon event complete with china tea cups and tea! Altrusans assist in various ways including setting up the event and serving. This event is attended by the clients and their families.

Volunteer's dedication to Cottonwood Art Festival provides a testament to the quality of the event

A new artist or first-time visitor inquiring about the Cottonwood Art Festival need only talk to Glenda Endres to find out if it's time well spent. Endres, who marks her 14th year of volunteering at Cottonwood this May and was an exhibiting artist at the Festival for more than 30 years, would give them a resounding. "Yes!"

"This is one of the top shows in the nation." said Endres. "It is very, very well-tun—it's only had two directors in its 50 years, and it really makes a difference having a staff that knows what they're doing."

Once a full-time potter. Endres first heard about Cottonwood while studying for her master's degree in clay at Texas Women's University, and tried out the Festival with a group of fellow art students.

"When I first exhibited, you placed your art on blankets," she recalled. "You could not set up for the show before the day of the festival, so at 12:01 a.m. we'd throw our blankets down, claim our spots, put all our stuff out and wait there until morning to pay our booth fee."

It soon became one of her favorite shows. Endres cites the Festival's quality of artwork and number of exhibiting artists as factors that make it "click." Cottonwood is a juried art show, limiting the number of artists accepted to around 240 (out of an average 1.400 submissions). Endres explained that good shows keep the right balance between artists and expected attendees—"If there are too many artists, it can be hard for any of them to earn enough to make it financially worth being there."

She also likes how Cottonwood has evolved in its presentation, to where artists now bring shelving, tents, pedestals and backdrops to display their art "like a museum."

As a whinteer, Endres helps stuff information packets for artists during the week prior to the Festival, helps with artist checkin, walks throughout the grounds two hours before opening to talk to artists and help troubleshoot, and continues troubleshooting throughout the weekend, sometimes being a booth "sitter" if an artist who's working alone needs a break. Other volunteers help staff activities at ArtStop, the interactive children's area.

"Cottonwood was good to me so it's good to give back," said Endres. "This keeps me in the loop, I get to come and see wonderful art, and

buy it, too," she laughed, "Volunteering in whatever you're passionate about is a good way to give back to the community."

City maintains highest credit rating from Moody's and S&P

For the 10th year in a row, both the Moody's and Standard & Poor's credit rating agencies have reaffirmed Richardson's "Triple A" status, the highest possible rating avuilable for credit worthiness. Richardson has held AAA status from Standard & Poor's for 12 years now, and this is the 10th year in a row the City has received an Aaa rating from Moody's.

In its rationale, Standard & Poor's said Richardson's "Triple A" rating was based on the City's, "very strong economy, very strong management with strong financial policies and practices, very strong budgetary flexibility, strong budgetary performance, very strong liquidity, and a strong institutional framework."

In its rationale, Moody's said. Bichardson's "strong credit profile is supported by a healthy local economy, favorable resident income levels and historically stable financial position. The credit is further bolstered by a sophisticated, policy-driven management team that budgets conservatively and maintains the city's financial flexibility and stability, offsetting the below median reserve position."

"In Richardson, one of our goals it to effectively and efficiently manage. City resources while

maintaining and enhancing City services," said Richardson Mayor Paul Voelker. "We are able to do this thanks to our strong financial position and fiscal management policies, which allow us to continue to make necessary investments in infrastructure, as well as other areas that enhance the quality of life for our stakeholders. We are proud to more again he recognized by Standard & Poor's and Mondy's and to know that we have met their highest standards for fiscal responsibility."

This year the City plans to sell approximately \$49.4 million in bonds. This includes \$17.4 million for the continuation of the serial sale of bonds associated with projects that are part of the 2015 Bond Program and \$32 million for capital needs, which include funds for water and sewer infrastructure improvements, emergency services equipment, information technology equipment, streets, park trails and public facilities including the Public Safety Campus and Fire Station 3.

Portal installation to begin at Spring Creek Nature Area

The granite pieces that will make up the two Spring Greek Nature Area entry portals should start being delivered in mid-April. The entry portals will be located at the intersections of Renner Road and Plano Road, and Renner Road and Routh Creek Parkway. Delivery will occur first at the intersection of Renner and Plano on the northeast side of the Nature Area, followed by



lowed by Renner and Routh Creek on the Nature Area's northwes

The delivery and installation process is expected to take up to a month, during which time temporary lane closures will occur in the eastbound Benner Boad right turn lane at Plano Boad, as well as the righthand northbound lane of Bouth Creek Parkway at Renner Boad. The closures are necessary so a crane can unload the large granite pieces that make up the portals.

The pieces will welcome visitors to the 100-acre Spring Creek Nature Area and have a leaf theme with a large leaf-shaped cutout in each granite portal, granite benches and a leaf-shaped granite sculpture. The idea for the portals came from the Spring Creek Nature Area Master Plan, which was developed and approved in 2015 and outlines ideas for development of the 56 additional acres acquired for the park in January 2015.

Construction on the Spring Creek Nature Area perimeter (mil, on which the portals will be located, began last summer and is complete except for the areas immediately surrounding the entry portals. In addition to encircling the park, the trail provides safe and easy access from the Spring Creek Nature Area to Foxboro Park.







During the annual State of the City Address last month, Mayor Paul Voelker talked about Richardson's "value proposition" and how the City strives to be the location for those looking to create a home or build a business, with the goal of creating points of differentiation that enable Richardson to remain a top choice in the DFW Metroplex.

"Our value proposition is our promise of what we as a city government will deliver to you," Mayor Voelker said. "How we do it more economically, with a greater consideration for leveraging resources and with a focus on service. It is the difference you hear in the way we answer the phone and the speed at which we respond to your needs. Our success is the result of a history of good planning and City Councils have gone through a process to chart a course for the future. Over the decades this long-term planning process has resulted in the development of the Telecom Corridor' area and helped shape our strong commercial office development while also envisioning the neighborhood amenities that make Richardson a place we love to call home.

During his Address, Mayor Voelker stressed that the City's value proposition is only enhanced by the many strong local and regional partnerships that have been established. He recognized educational partners UT Dallas, RISD, PISD, Richland and Collin colleges; health care partner Methodist Richardson Medical Center; the Richardson Chamber of Commerce; Dallas and Collin county commisresentatives: and board members and officials from the North Texas Municipal Water District and Dallas Area Rapid Transit (DART).

"Our partnerships have led to signature projects in our city," he said. "Fossil's new headquarters, Blue Gross Blue Shield of Texas

headquarters and the development of CityLine, home to State Farm and Raytheon facilities are just a few. And this past year, commercial leasing activity in Richardson was so active it led to our Telecom Corridor* area ranking as one of the hottest office markets in North Texas."

Mayor Voelker highlighted recent news concerning Richardson's longtime partner DART. and the announcement in December that the Cotton Belt Commuter Bail Line has been fully funded. The project includes a 26-mile commuter rail corridor from Plano through Richardson to the DFW International Airport. It will connect with Fort Worth's TEX Bail line, providing a direct route from a new second station at CityLine to downtown Fort Worth. The new rail line will run through the northern part of Richardson with a stop on the UT Dallas campus. It will also include an adjacent hikeand-bike trail and noise wall structures near residential areas. The City is working closely

with DART on the design and construction of an enhanced bridge feature over US 75.

"Our partnership with DART has brought lasting benefits to our community and provided economic mobility for the people who depend on transit services every day," he said. "We are excited to see this vision become a reality and look forward to riding the train to DFW Airport when the project is completed in late 2022

Mayor Voelker closed the address by highlighting some future and long-term projects that are underway including the Collins/Arapaho TOD and Innovation District vision and improving and revitalizing the City's downtown district.























The Choose Kind Library signs are 20" x 30" or 24" x 36 " on foam core and stand to designate the Choose Kind sections of the school libraries.
