Our club has partnered for several years with Mike's Kids, a non-profit organization focusing on assistance for children and adults in the Rio Grande area of Texas and Mexico. It was started by Samanthia Slaight's husband several years ago after observing the extreme poverty in the area. In November, Samanthia spoke to her contact in Mexico and there was an urgent request for leggings as protection for the women in the refugee camps, who are experiencing sexual abuse. We rose to the occasion and made personal donations of not only leggings but under garments, personal care items and clothing. The Kindness and Outreach Committees made donations, too. We also involved other Altrusa Clubs and other organizations our members are involved with. More than thirty boxes of items were donated through our efforts.

Another Successful World Peace Art Contest

Janie Jaquier again lead our partnership in sponsoring the World Peace Art Contest with the Richardson Public Library, Richardson Civic Arts Society, and Richardson Arts Alliance. This year's theme was "Peace Begins With Us". Sixteen schools and fifty-four artists participated. Altrusa organizes the event, checks in the art, assists with the framing and display of the art and hosts the Awards Reception. The professional framing is donated by Canyon Creek Art and Frame, and displayed on the 3rd floor of the Richardson Public Library. This year's first place winner is Angelina Godina from Stultz Road Elementary.



Choose Kind Libraries Expand Again, SIX TIMES!



The kids of The Bridge Kids Mission in Bogata Columbia where one of our three new International Choose Kind Libraries are located.

With the help of the \$3,200 grant received from the Altrusa International Foundation, the Choose Kind Libraries have expanded with three new international libraries. The first is in the Kids Mission, Bogata, Columbia. (See the picture to the left.) The second is in another orphanage that Brian Williams' Think Kind organization works with in Uganda. Think Kind is making a trip in January and are taking the books to the orphanage. The third library is being established in the orphanage in Matamoros. The books were sent on the truck that left on December 11th.

Three new schools in the RISD are being added, too. The locations are O'Henry Elementary, Spring Creek Elementary and Mark Twain Elementary. The books for each of these schools have been ordered but not delivered to the schools yet.

UNITED NATIONS OBSERVANCES

December 2019 and January 2020 U.N. Days and Observances

World Aids Day, December 1, 2019: The theme of 2019 is "Communities Make the Difference"

World AIDS Day offers an important platform to highlight the role of communities at a time when reduced funding and a shrinking space for civil society are putting the sustainability of services and advocacy efforts in jeopardy. Greater mobilization of communities is urgently required to address the barriers that stop communities delivering services, including restrictions on registration and an absence of social contracting modalities. The strong advocacy role played by communities is needed more than ever to ensure that AIDS remains on the political agenda, that human rights are respected and that decision-makers and implementers are held accountable.

International Day of Persons With Disabilities, December 3, 2019: The 2019 theme is "Promoting the participation of persons with disabilities and their leadership". This year, the International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPD) focuses on the empowerment of persons with disabilities for inclusive, equitable and sustainable development as anticipated in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which pledges to 'leave no one behind' and recognizes disability as a cross-cutting issue, to be considered in the implementation of its <u>17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)</u>.

Human Rights Day, December 10, 2019: The 2019 theme: Youth Standing Up for Human Rights

Human Rights Day is observed every year on 10 December — the day the United Nations General Assembly adopted, in 1948, the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u> (UDHR): a milestone document proclaiming the inalienable rights which everyone is inherently entitled to as a human being regardless of race, colour, religion, sex, language, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. Available in more than <u>500 languages</u>, it is the most translated document in the world.

Altrusa International member Eleanor Roosevelt served as the Chairperson of the drafting committee of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Where, after all, do universal human rights begin? In small places, close to home – so close and so small that they cannot be seen on any maps of the world. [...] Unless these rights have meaning there, they have little meaning anywhere. Without concerted citizen action to uphold them close to home, we shall look in vain for progress in the larger world." —Eleanor Roosevelt



International Day of Education, January 24, 2020: the first International Day of Educa-

tion was observed January 2019. By proclaiming the <u>International Day of Education</u>, UN member states recognized the importance of working to ensure inclusive and equitable quality education at all levels – so that all people may have access to lifelong learning opportunities that help them to acquire the knowledge and skills needed to access opportunities to participate fully in society and contribute to sustainable development. The right to education is enshrined in article 26 of the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u>. The declaration calls for free and compulsory elementary education. The <u>Convention on the Rights of the Child</u>, adopted in 1989, goes further to stipulate that countries shall make higher education accessible to all.

International Day of Commemoration of the Victims of the Holocaust, January 27, 2020: "75 Years After Auschwitz- Holocaust Education and Remembrance for Global Justice"

2020 marks the 75th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, the ending of the Second World War, and the ending of the Holocaust. 2020 also marks the establishment of the United Nations, formed in response to atrocity crimes of the Holocaust and the Second World War, with the aim of building a world that is just and peaceful. Acknowledging the milestone year, the Holocaust and the United Nations Outreach Programme has chosen as the theme for Holocaust education and remembrance in 2020, "75 years after Auschwitz - Holocaust Education and Remembrance for Global Justice". The theme reflects the continued importance, 75 years after the Holocaust, of collective action against antisemitism and other forms of bias to ensure respect for the dignity and human rights of all people everywhere.
