

But, it may be a good idea to download the Zoom App on your smart device for a more secure connection, in case you experience any issues in the future. (Note: If you are hosting a Zoom meeting, the features on a computer are easier to use. there are instructions on how to host a Zoom meeting on our website under Members Only/How to Zoom.) Go to your App store and search "Zoom Cloud Meetings"

**From Collin County:** You may have heard that Zoom has been having some issues recently. Apparently now that school is back in session, so many schools are using Zoom to teach online that it became more than Zoom could handle. They recommended downloading the Zoom App (since it continued to play), rather than clicking the web link.



You will need to create an account but it's free and you can use it for 40 minutes at a time to communicate with family and friends! **Invitation to Serve your Club and your Community**

This past year our club had planned to hold a Days for Girls District Nine service project at Conference in April but due to the pandemic the Conference was cancelled, which delayed this project. Over the summer the supplies pledged to this project have been collected from District clubs and on August 8<sup>th</sup> a workday to assemble kits was held. Following COVID-19 safety guidelines volunteers were limited. Jane Tucker and Garland club members Mary Powlen, Elizabeth Fuentes, and Christina Contreras met at the home of District Nine First Vice Governor Shirley Raymer to assemble 134 kits. Beverly Lenoir dropped off 60 assembled kits from the Collin County club.

The Rowlett Days for Girls Team had alerted our members that there was an immediate alert calling for all Days for Girls Chapters and Teams to come together to support the DfG Lebanon Enterprises. The August 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020 massive explosion in Beirut which had killed more than 150, injured over 5,000 and displaced over 300,000 has created an overwhelming task for the DfG Lebanon Enterprises trying to provide emergency menstrual supplies to not only refugees but also the women and girls affected by this disaster. Because of this crisis, the 194 kits assembled were mailed to a collection point in Liberty, Missouri for shipment to Beirut.

Future workdays during the fall are planned until all the kits have been assembled. Hopefully, a total of 500 will be completed and distributed to areas in need of Days for Girls kits.

## **Altrusa Richardson Assists Days for Girls Turn Periods Into Pathways**

For three years our Club has been working with Days for Girls to assemble kits for distribution in Africa and Bogota, Columbia. The assembled kits containing shields, liners, panties, a washcloth, soap, transport bag, menstrual chart, and drawstring bag have allowed hundreds of women and girls to manage their menstruation with dignity and help shatter the stigma and limitations associated with menstruation.

Another area of Days for Girls has emerged. Starting in 2012, a small team of leaders Uganda began the mission of developing the goal of Days for Girls into a sustainable, locally oriented business model allowing women and girls the opportunity to make and sell the kits for themselves. It took a year of program design, planning, and evaluation to officially launch the Days for Girls Enterprise in 2013. More than ever before, due to the pandemic the world is in upheaval and Days for Girls kits are in high demand. During the first quarter of 2020, Days for Girls African Enterprises were able to provide employment opportunities for women in sub-Saharan Africa. In March, Enterprise leaders in sixteen countries met in Kenya and Uganda with a team from Days for Girls International. These leaders were instructed on ways to improve their businesses which included branding, marketing, reporting, time management, budgeting, and goal setting. They also received information about improvements to the Ambassador of Women's Health and Men Who Know curriculums. The leaders also met with and received support from government officials in Kenya and went to schools to provide menstrual education and DfG kits. Even with the recent COVID-19 pandemic crisis the Days for Girls African Enterprises have continued to provide menstrual supplies and education to women and girls. They have even started making masks for local healthcare workers and those individuals most vulnerable to spread the virus.

More than ever before, these women and girls in Africa are needing our help to keep up the work that is going on there. To assist in this effort our club has donated items to help the Days for Girls Enterprise in Kumpala, Uganda. Through an Altrusa International Days for Girls grant our club has been able to not only help with purchasing and helping to prepare almost 500 kits for our 2020 District Service Project but through our workshop sessions held in January and February 2020 have also able to cut extra shields and transfer bags which our club has donated to the Highland Village Days for Girls Team. They plan to send the supplies to the Kumpala Enterprise which will allow them to sew over 200 shields and transfer bags. To quote Celeste Mergens, Founder and CEO of Days for Girls, "Periods don't pause for pandemics" so we need to continue supporting the effort of helping **every girl, everywhere, period.**

**Kindness Committee Spreading Kindness Around the World**

The Kindness Committee has been busy this summer with getting our plans for the 2020-2021 fiscal year started. We have made or will make monetary donations to the following charities:

\$432 to TeachHaiti that helps with the education of Willnise Pierre Louis, a little girl going into the 5<sup>th</sup> grade

\$500 to HELPS International where we are supporting the education of Senayda Isabela Torres Medina who will be in the seventh grade this school year

\$200 of our budget is going to Think Kindness/VIMA – Ghana, a new charity we chose to support because it is an orphanage in Ghana where we donated a Choose Kind Library in 2019. They are in need of educational supplies as well as cleaning and sanitizing supplies due to the COVID-19 virus.

\$350 is going to support Mike’s Kids (through Southwest Good Samaritan Ministries) which helps a non-profit feed and clothe the poorest in the Rio Grande Valley. We also have a Choose Kind Library at the El Puente Orphanage in Matemores. Mike’s Kids was founded by our Altrusa President Samantha Slaight’s late husband.

Our “hands-on” project for the first half of this year is to send boxes of desired items to our military in the Middle East. We are working with three chaplains to distribute the items as they see fit. Sue McElveen has been hard at work finding the best deals on items like baby wipes, razors, jerky, and coffee packets. The plan is to send several boxes of goodies at a time to a chaplain over the remaining months in 2020. We will rotate through the committee roster so that only 2 members at a time are preparing and shipping the boxes.

Another project we have begun to plan is to purchase, package, and donate feminine hygiene items to New Friends New Life (NFNL) which is a 501 (c) (3) organization located in the Dallas-Fort Worth area dedicated to restoring and empowering formerly trafficked girls and sexually exploited women and their children. This project will be done during the first half of 2021.

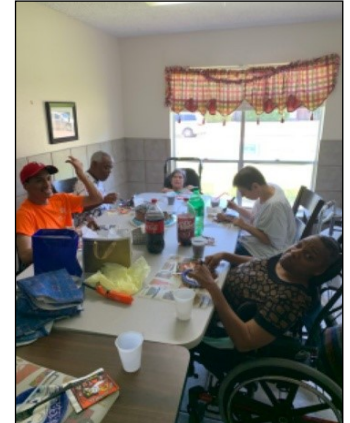

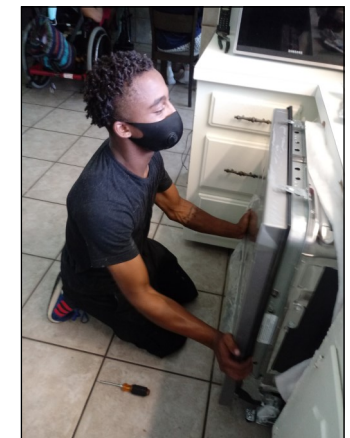

## THE CORONA VIRUS CAN'T STOP ALTRUSANS

No ugly virus stops Altrusa Richardson members when we get marching, or should we say, “get busy”. After the first Community Outreach Committee meeting on Zoom in July and with budget settled, the Community Outreach Committee got busy. The COVID virus has led to many families without a source of income making it hard for families to prepare their children for the new school year. We want to make sure children of our community will start school clean and fresh. With school starting in August or September,

it was agreed that from the committee budget, five cases of backpacks (120) of various colors, would be purchased and donated to NETWORK of Community Ministries for their Tools4School program. NETWORK had purchased school supply kits and were placing them in donated backpacks. Gloria Sandoval and Carol Ruszkowski, Community Outreach Co-Chairs, delivered the backpacks on August 3rd. Also for NETWORK, Community Outreach, with the generosity of Altrusa Richardson members, collected 255 pairs of girl’s panties, 130 boys briefs, 206 girls socks, 186 pairs boys socks and 79 pairs of new shoes. All items were delivered to Carol and Gloria’s homes, whether in person or by Walmart or Amazon. We are so lucky to have such generous

members in our club. Laurel Stanley, of NETWORK received all clothing items on August 11<sup>th</sup>. She stated that without partners like Altrusa, their work would be much harder.

On August 13, 2020, sundries requested by Hope’s Door/New Beginnings (HDNB), were delivered by Gayle Ingle, Carol Ruszkowski and Gloria Sandoval to their Plano Outreach Center for their Shelter. Beth Roberts of the Plano Center said she was so happy to receive Altrusa’s donation because they were extremely low on some of these items. Funds to purchase the sundries came from the Community Outreach budget and several donations from members. Carol and Gloria shopped and emptied Walmart shelves of Suave shampoo/conditioner, body lotion, toothpaste. Also requested were ziplock freezer bags, all sizes, laundry detergent, kitchen work gloves, 5 cases of masks (250), and towels. Gloria had foot surgery

recently and was driving an electric cart carrying all the items. She was zooming all over the place trying to keep up with Carol.

August 15, 2020, was the RISD Backpack Bash. This was a drive through distribution of student backpacks filled with school supplies at Richardson high schools parking lots. RISD had requested Altrusa members to help with the distribution.
